





Books to go home - exciting changes

- Bring your child's book bag in every day please they will read from their decodable book when 1:1 reading with an adult.
- We will change their decodable book on Fridays, this will be the book they have read that week.
- · Story books will be changed twice a week



Practising phonics: Phase 2

- Read the book three times over three reading practice sessions.
- Focus on a different aspect of reading each time: decoding, prosody and comprehension.

Revisit and review: Pre-read

 Before reading the book, ask the children to read the GPCs, words and tricky words.
 Encourage them to read the words fluently.





Practise and apply: Read the book

- · Now ask the children to read the book.
- · Tap-in and listen to each child read.





Use your assessment from hearing the children read to choose any GPCs, words or tricky words that need additional practice.

- Ask the children to sound talk and blend each of the following words: d/i/ng, s/i/ng, r/i/ng and w/i/ng.
- Ask the children:
 - o Which of the following words contain the /ng/ sound? Jack sing ping fox box long (sing, ping, long)
- Look at the "I spy sounds" pages (14-15) together. Discuss the picture with the children. Can the children see any pictures of things that contain the /j/ and /x/ sounds? (jam, jelly, juice, jug, Jack-in-a-box, jeep, taxi, fox, x-ray, Max)

Read 2: Prosody

- · Model reading each page with expression to the children. After you have read each page, ask the children to have a go at reading with expression.
- . On pages 3, 7 and 13, show the children how you read the words ding dong with expression as if a bell were ringing and encourage children to use different voices and tones.

Read 3: Comprehension

- · For every question ask the children how they know the answer. Ask:
 - o Why do you think the story was called "Ding Dong"? (because it is about the bell ringing, it describes the noise a bell makes)
 - o Who comes to visit Max? (Jill the squirrel and Jack the bird)
- o Jill and Jack both take toys to the bat box. What is your favourite toy and why?
- o Why do you think Max rings the bell on pages 12 and 13? (e.g. It is time for his friends to go home)

How you can help...

- > 'Listening to and talking about stories and non-fiction develops children's vocabulary...

 Understanding vocabulary is vital for comprehension and for wider learning and progress.'
- > One book in the book bag will be at your child's level, and the other is a book they have chosen to read, it might be funny or silly, fiction or non-fiction, and it may come home more than once as a favourite, it is always your child's choice.
- > Please write a comment in your child's reading record displaying what they enjoyed about the book or the words they were able to read.
- > You only need to write one comment for the story book in the reading record. You do not need to write a comment about the decodable book.
- > Please read to and with your child every night and make reading apart of their lives.
