

Policy on Staff Dress Code



Updated based on the responses from the consultation during November/December 2022 involving all staff members.

Bigland Green School recognises that dress and appearance are matters of personal choice and self-expression. To dress professionally shows pride, effort, respect for self and the profession. Bigland Green believes that all staff members represent the school in a professional capacity and as such are the ambassadors of the school. Pupils are influenced by role models around them. Teachers¹ are one of the main role models for pupils at Bigland Green.

Aims and objectives

All staff members² play an important role in the process of increasing children's life chances and preparing pupils for the future. It is important that the school provides best example of role modelling of appropriate dress code, particularly in relation to health and safety, and appropriateness in different workplaces for later life.

Underlying principles

All staff members must dress in a manner that is appropriate to a professional role and that promotes a professional image in accordance with the school dress code. Staff members as role models for pupils³ are expected to be suitably attired to meet safeguarding and professional presentation expectations. The staff dress code at Bigland Green is underpinned by the following three principals and takes into account available guidance from professional association(s)⁴:

- Professionalism – taking pride in appropriate dressing for their specific roles in the school.
- Comfort – staff members may exercise personal comfort choices that are not contradictory to this policy.
- Individual personality – staff members have a right to exercise their individuality including their cultural/religious preferences provided that they are not contradictory to the underlying principles of this policy.

Staff dress code

All staff members should dress safely and appropriately for the tasks they undertake and not breach health and safety regulations. Staff members should dress in suitable smart/professional clothing and footwear that provides the necessary flexibility of movement and comfort which is necessary for teaching in a primary school. However, this would not apply on 'non-uniform' or Training Days when teachers are free to dress casually.

Staff members should dress in a manner that is not offensive, revealing or sexually provocative; and in a manner that is absent from political or contentious slogans at all times. Tattoos and body art should be covered while staff are in school as appropriate.

When teaching PE all staff members must wear a house-coloured t-shirt and trainers as the basic minimum. T-shirts should not be worn over clothes that are normally for outside. Staff members are encouraged to change before PE to jogging/tracksuits or other appropriate attire and back to professional attire afterwards. The school has a changing/shower room for staff members.

While *common sense* and *professional judgement* principles apply to the vast majority of decisions staff members make about their conduct and presentation at work, the table below provides some examples of the application of the school dress code at Bigland Green.

Discreet earrings or nose pins are acceptable but all other body piercings should be removed while on school premises. Precaution must be taken with items of jewellery that are worn and health and safety must be prioritised.

The guidance in this policy is not meant to detail every eventuality. It is up to individual staff members to decide whether their appearance is appropriate and guided by the principles in this policy. Bigland Green is committed to promoting diversity and will therefore respect individual preference in terms of customs, culture and tradition.

Implementation of this policy

Any staff members who is dressed inappropriately must be reported to their immediate line manager. Line managers will discuss the matters that are reported with the individual concerned in a sensitive and supportive manner. Repeated breach of this guidance will be dealt with by a member of the School Leadership Team (SLT) in accordance with the most appropriate school policy.

This policy will be reviewed periodically as necessary.
